A SPECTRAL SEQUENCE FOR THE HOMOTOPY OF NICE SPACES(¹)

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1. Introduction. Using the approach of [C], [R] and [6A], we construct for each space X, a spectral sequence converging (almost always) to the homotopy groups of X modulo odd torsion. This can be considered an "unstable Adams spectral sequence" in that it agrees with the ordinary mod-2 Adams spectral sequence [A] for a stable range of dimensions. Furthermore our spectral sequence agrees with that of [M,P] when theirs is defined. However our version has these advantages: it is more generally defined, has an E_1 -term suitable for computation, and has an E_2 -term which is homologically describable for *nice* spaces (see 2.2).

Our statements and constructions are in terms of simplicial sets, simplicial groups etc. Corresponding statements for topological spaces may be obtained by means of the singular complex and geometric realization functors.

For each connected simplicial set K, the spectral sequence $[E_rK]$ arises from the homotopy exact couple associated with a modified lower central series filtration of Kan's simplicial loop group GK. If K is simply connected with finitely generated homotopy groups, then $\{E_rK\}$ converges to π_*K modulo odd torsion. In order to describe E_2K homologically, we assume that $H_*(K; Z_2)$ is a nice homology coalgebra as in [B]. This condition is satisfied, for example, when $H^*(K; Z_2)$ factors as the tensor product of polynomial and truncated polynomial algebras. Under the niceness assumption, we construct a fundamental chain complex whose homology is E_2K . This complex, and hence E_2K , depends only on $H_*(K; Z_2)$ as a coalgebra over the Steenrod algebra.

The paper is in two parts. In Part I, we construct the spectral sequence and the fundamental chain complex. We derive a simplified E_1 -term in the Massey-Peterson case, and then give our homological interpretation of E_2K when $H_*(K; Z_2)$ is nice. In Part II, we prove that the fundamental chain complex serves as an E_1 -term for our spectral sequence. The proof involves a detailed study of a closely related spectral sequence defined by Rector [R].

Using a very different approach from ours, D. M. Kan and the first author [B,K] have developed a mod-*p* spectral sequence, for all primes *p*, which has the

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advantage that, without any niceness assumption, the E_2 -term admits a homological description (as in §6). On the other hand, the advantage of our present work is that for nice spaces the E_2 -term is more accessible, as the homology of the fundamental chain complex. This becomes useful in the examples (forthcoming) of S^n , SU(n), BU(n), SO(n), BO(n), Stiefel manifolds, and especially SF, BSF.

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1.1. Conventions. Let K be a reduced simplicial set; that is, K has only one vertex. Let H_*K denote the homology of K with Z_2 coefficients. The diagonal map $K \rightarrow K \times K$ induces a comultiplication

$$\Delta: H_*K \to H_*K \otimes H_*K$$

making H_*K a homology coalgebra, that is, a connected cocommutative coalgebra. Also H_*K is a right module over the Steenrod algebra, A, with operations

$$(\cdot) Sq^i: H_n K \to H_{n-i} K$$

which dualize to the usual Steenrod operations in cohomology. Similar conventions apply to the reduced homology \tilde{H}_*K .

2. The spectral sequence and the fundamental chain complex. To construct the spectral sequence, we first recall that the mod-2 *lower central series* of a group G is the filtration (see [R])

$$G = \Gamma_1 G \supset \cdots \supset \Gamma_s G \supset \Gamma_{s+1} G \supset \cdots$$

where $\Gamma_s G$ is the subgroup of G generated by all $\langle g_1, \ldots, g_k \rangle^{2^t}$ such that $2^t k \ge s$, the $g_i \in G$, and $\langle \ldots, \rangle$ is the simple commutator. For a reduced simplicial set K, the *loop group GK* (defined in [K]) is a free simplicial group for which

$$\pi_{q-1}(GK) \approx \pi_q(K), \qquad \pi_{q-1}(GK/\Gamma_2GK) \approx \tilde{H}_q(K).$$

We filter GK (in each dimension) by the modified mod-2 lower central series

$$GK \supset \Gamma_2 GK \supset \cdots \supset \Gamma_{2^*} GK \supset \Gamma_{2^{*+1}} GK \supset \cdots$$

The associated homotopy exact couple gives rise to a spectral sequence $\{E_r K\}$:

$$E_1^{s,t}(K) = \pi_{t-s-1}(\Gamma_{2^s}GK/\Gamma_{2^{s+1}}GK), \qquad d_r \colon E_r^{s,t}(K) \to E_r^{s+r,t+r-1}(K).$$

Let $\pi_*(K; 2)$ denote the quotient of π_*K by the subgroup of elements of odd finite order. The following theorem summarizes results of [R] and [6A].

THEOREM 2.1. If K is simply connected with finitely generated homotopy groups, then $\{E_rK\}$ converges to $\pi_*(K; 2)$. More precisely $E_r^{s,t}(K) = E_{\infty}^{s,t}(K)$ for large r, and $\{E_{\infty}^{s,s+n}(K)\}_{s\geq 0}$ is the graded group of a complete decreasing filtration of $\pi_n(K; 2)$. For $r\geq 2$, $\{E_rK\}$ coincides in the stable range with the mod-2 Adams spectral sequence.

2.2. Nice homology coalgebras. In general E_2K seems to depend on the "higher order" structure of H_*K ; but this difficulty is avoided when H_*K is a nice homology

coalgebra, as in [B]. To recall the notion of niceness, we first suppose that C is a homology coalgebra of finite type over Z_2 ; that is, C is finitely generated in each dimension. Then C is *nice* if and only if the dual algebra C^* has a presentation $C^* \approx R/I$ where R is a connected polynomial algebra of finite type over Z_2 and I is a Borel ideal (see [S, p. 79]). By [S, p. 80] this is equivalent to the condition that $C^* \approx R \otimes_B Z_2$ where R is as above, B is a polynomial subalgebra of R, and R is free as a B-module. The definition of niceness for an arbitrary homology coalgebra over Z_2 is obtained by suitably dualizing the foregoing condition on C^* . We remark that by [B, 4.1], a homology coalgebra C is nice if and only if $R^n P(C) = 0$ for n > 1 where $R^n P$ is the *n*th right derived functor of the primitive element functor.

Some (overlapping) examples of nice coalgebras are given by:

(i) If H_*K is the coalgebra of some Hopf algebra, then H_*K is nice.

(ii) If H^*K is of finite type and factors as a tensor product of polynomial and truncated polynomial algebras, then H_*K is nice.

In particular if K is homotopy equivalent to a loop space or to a sphere, then H_*K is nice. We sometimes call a space nice if its homology is nice.

2.3. The algebra Λ . Our fundamental chain complex for "computing" E_2K when K nice will involve the algebra Λ (= $E^1(S)$ in [6A]). Recall that Λ is the graded associative differential algebra with unit (over Z_2) with:

- (i) a generator λ_i of degree *i* for each $i \ge 0$,
- (ii) for each i, $k \ge 0$ a relation

$$\lambda_i \lambda_{2i+1+k} = \sum_{j \ge 0} \binom{k-1-j}{j} \lambda_{i+k-j} \lambda_{2i+1+j},$$

(iii) a differential ∂ given by

$$\partial(\lambda_i) = \sum_{j \ge 1} {\binom{i-j}{j}} \lambda_{i-j} \lambda_{j-1}.$$

Let $I = (i_1, \ldots, i_s)$ be a finite sequence of nonnegative integers. Call *I allowable* if $i_{j+1} \leq 2i_j$ for each 0 < j < s, or if *I* is empty. Then Λ has a \mathbb{Z}_2 -basis given by all $\lambda_I = \lambda_{i_1} \cdots \lambda_{i_s}$ with allowable *I* ($\lambda_I = 1$ when *I* empty). Note that $\Lambda = \bigoplus_{s \geq 0} \Lambda^s$ where Λ^s is generated by the monomials λ_I of length *s*. For $n \geq 0$ let $\Lambda(n)$ be the subspace of Λ generated by all allowable λ_I for which $i_1 < n$ or *I* empty. Each $\Lambda(n)$ is closed under ∂ , and in fact $\Lambda(n) \approx E_1(S^n)$ by [6A].

NOTATION. For a graded Z_2 -module M, let $M \otimes \Lambda$ (resp. $M \otimes \Lambda$) be the subspace of $M \otimes \Lambda$ generated by all $x \otimes \alpha$ with $x \in M_n$ and $\alpha \in \Lambda(n-1)$ (resp. $\alpha \in \Lambda(n)$). Also let $M \otimes \Lambda^s$ and $M \otimes \Lambda^s$ be the obvious summands.

2.4. The functor Ψ . A certain nonadditive functor Ψ will appear in our fundamental chain complex (2.5). The map

$$\Delta \otimes 1 + 1 \otimes \Delta \colon \tilde{H}_* K \otimes \tilde{H}_* K \to \tilde{H}_* K \otimes \tilde{H}_* K \otimes \tilde{H}_* K$$

restricts to a homomorphism $\delta^{\Delta}: L_2(\tilde{H}_*K) \to L_3(\tilde{H}_*K)$ where

$$L(\cdot) = \bigoplus_{r \ge 1} L_r(\cdot)$$

is the free restricted Lie algebra functor as in 7.2. We define

$$\Psi(H_*K) = \operatorname{Ker} \delta^{\Delta}.$$

The right action of the Steenrod algebra A on $H_*(K \times K) \approx H_*K \otimes H_*K$ induces a right A-module structure on $\Psi(H_*K)$, and the diagonal Δ restricts to a right A-module map

$$\Delta \colon \tilde{H}_* K \to \Psi(H_* K).$$

Let $\sigma: \Psi(H_*K) \to \tilde{H}_*K$ be the restriction of the homomorphism (halving degrees) $L_2(\tilde{H}_*K) \to \tilde{H}_*K$ which sends $x^{[2]} \to x$ and $[x, y] \to 0$ for $x, y \in \tilde{H}_*K$.

2.5. The fundamental chain complex. The following chain complex $W(H_*K)$ will serve as an E_1 -term for our spectral sequence when H_*K is nice. Define for each $s \ge 0$

$$W^{s}(H_{*}K) = (\tilde{H}_{*}K \otimes \Lambda^{s}) \oplus (\Psi(H_{*}K) \otimes \Lambda^{s-1}),$$

$$\delta \colon W^{s}(H_{*}K) \to W^{s+1}(H_{*}K),$$

where the differential δ has the following components:

(i) for $x \otimes \lambda_I \in H_n K \widetilde{\otimes} \Lambda^s$,

$$\delta(x \otimes \lambda_I) = \left(x \otimes \partial \lambda_I + \sum_{i=1}^m xSq^i \otimes \lambda_{i-1}\lambda_I\right) \oplus (\Delta x \otimes \lambda_I)$$

where m = [(n-1)/2];

(ii) for $x \otimes \lambda_I \in \Psi(H_*K) \otimes \Lambda^{s-1}$ when deg x = 2m+1

$$\delta(x \otimes \lambda_I) = (0) \oplus \left(x \otimes \partial \lambda_I + \sum_{i \geq 1} xSq^i \otimes \lambda_{i-1}\lambda_I\right)$$

and when deg x = 2m + 2

$$\delta(x \otimes \lambda_I) = \left(\sigma x \otimes (\partial \lambda_m) \lambda_I + \sum_{i \ge 1} (\sigma x) Sq^i \otimes (\lambda_{i-1} \lambda_m + \lambda_{m-i} \lambda_{2i-1}) \lambda_I\right)$$
$$\bigoplus \left(x \otimes \partial \lambda_I + \sum_{i=1}^m x Sq^i \otimes \lambda_{i-1} \lambda_I\right).$$

We give $W(H_*K)$ a bigradation such that $x \otimes \lambda_{i_1} \cdots \lambda_{i_s}$ is of bidegree (s, t) with

$$t = s + \deg x + \sum_{j=1}^{s} i_j.$$

Our main result is the following.

THEOREM 2.6. Let K be a reduced simplicial set such that H_*K is a nice coalgebra. Then there are natural isomorphisms

$$E_2^{s,t}(K) \approx H^{s,t}(W(H_*K))$$

for all s, t.

This will be proved in §13.

COROLLARY 2.7. If H_*K is nice then E_2K depends only on the structure of H_*K as a coalgebra over the Steenrod algebra.

3. Unstable modules over the Steenrod algebra. The problem of computing E_2K via the fundamental chain complex will often reduce (see §§4-5) to that of computing Ext groups for unstable modules over the Steenrod algebra A.

DEFINITION 3.1. An unstable right A-module consists of a graded right A-module $M(M_n=0 \text{ for } n<0)$ such that $xSq^i \in M_{n-i}$ for $x \in M_n$ and $xSq^i=0$ for 2i > n.

Let $\mathcal{M}A$ denote the category of unstable right A-modules, and note that each $\tilde{H}_*K \in \mathcal{M}A$. It is straightforward to show that $\mathcal{M}A$ is an abelian category with enough injectives. The sth right derived functor of

Hom_{*MA*}
$$(\tilde{H}_*(S^t), \cdot)$$

will be called

 $\operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{M}_A}^{s,t}(Z_2,M)$

for s, $t \ge 0$ and $M \in \mathcal{M}A$.

3.2. A complex for Ext. A simplified form of the fundamental chain complex may be used to compute the above Ext. For $M \in \mathcal{M}A$, let V(M) be the chain complex with

$$V^{s}(M) = M \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^{s}, \qquad s \ge 0,$$

$$\delta(x \otimes \lambda_{I}) = x \otimes \partial \lambda_{I} + \sum_{i \ge 1} xSq^{i} \otimes \lambda_{i-1}\lambda_{I}.$$

As before $x \otimes \lambda_{i_1} \cdots \lambda_{i_s}$ is given bidegree (s, t) with $t = s + \deg x + \sum_{j=1}^{s} i_j$.

THEOREM 3.3. For $M \in \mathcal{M}A$ and s, $t \ge 0$ there is a natural isomorphism

 $\operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{M}_A}^{s,t}(Z_2,M) \approx H^{s,t}(V(M)).$

This will be proved in 3.6.

3.4. The functors S, Ω and Ω^1 . The following definitions are dual to those of [M,P]. For $M \in \mathcal{M}A$ let $SM \in \mathcal{M}A$ be given by $(SM)_i = M_{i-1}$ with the same A action as M. This "suspension" functor has a right adjoint "loop" functor Ω . Define $\Omega M \in \mathcal{M}A$ by

$$(\Omega M)_{2i} = M_{2i+1}, \qquad (\Omega M)_{2i-1} = \operatorname{Ker} \left(Sq^i \colon M_{2i} \to M_i \right)$$

with A action on ΩM induced by that on M. The functor Ω is left exact and has a first derived functor Ω^1 , where $\Omega^1 M \in \mathcal{M}A$ is defined by

$$(\Omega^1 M)_{2i} = 0, \qquad (\Omega^1 M)_{2i-1} = \operatorname{Coker} (Sq^i \colon M_{2i} \to M_i)$$

with

$$Sq^{2j}: (\Omega^1 M)_{2i-1} \to (\Omega^1 M)_{2i-2j-1}$$

induced by $Sq^i: M_i \to M_{i-j}$.

There is a natural inclusion $i: \Omega M \to M$ raising degree by one, and a natural projection $p: M \to \Omega^1 M$ sending degree d to degree 2d-1.

Note that if

$$0 \to M' \to M \to M'' \to 0$$

is a short exact sequence in MA, there is induced an exact sequence in MA

$$0 \to \Omega M' \to \Omega M \to \Omega M'' \to \Omega^1 M' \to \Omega^1 M \to \Omega^1 M'' \to 0.$$

The following lemma, together with 3.3, will often provide an inductive procedure for computing $\text{Ext}_{\mathcal{M}_A}(\mathbb{Z}_2, M)$.

LEMMA 3.5. Let $M \in \mathcal{M}A$ with $M_0 = 0$. Then there is a natural exact sequence

$$\cdots \to H^{s,t}(V(\Omega M)) \to H^{s,t+1}(V(M)) \to H^{s-1,t}(V(\Omega^1 M))$$
$$\to H^{s+1,t}(V(\Omega M)) \to H^{s+1,t+1}(V(M)) \to \cdots$$

Proof. Filter V(M) by subcomplexes $F_2V(M) \subseteq F_1V(M) \subseteq V(M)$ as follows:

$$F_2V(M) = \text{Image} (V(i): V(\Omega M) \to V(M)),$$

$$F_1V^s(M) = \text{Ker} (h^s: V^s(M) \to V^{s-1}(\Omega^1 M)),$$

where for $x \in M_{n+1}$, $\lambda_I = \lambda_{i_1} \cdots \lambda_{i_s}$,

$$h^{s}(x \otimes \lambda_{l}) = 0, \qquad i_{1} < n,$$

= $p(x) \otimes \lambda_{i_{2}} \cdots \lambda_{i_{s}}, \qquad i_{1} = n.$

It is straightforward to verify that the chain complex $F_1V(M)/F_2V(M)$ is acyclic. The lemma now follows from the isomorphisms

$$H^{\mathfrak{s}}(F_{2}V(M)) \approx H^{\mathfrak{s}}(V(\Omega M)),$$
$$H^{\mathfrak{s}}(V(M)/F_{1}V(M)) \approx H^{\mathfrak{s}-1}(V(\Omega^{1}M)).$$

3.6. Proof of 3.3. A short exact sequence

$$0 \to M' \to M \to M'' \to 0$$

in $\mathcal{M}A$ gives a natural exact sequence

$$\cdots \to H^{\mathfrak{s},\mathfrak{t}}(V(M')) \to H^{\mathfrak{s},\mathfrak{t}}(V(M)) \to H^{\mathfrak{s},\mathfrak{t}}(V(M')) \to H^{\mathfrak{s}+1,\mathfrak{t}}(V(M')) \to \cdots$$

Thus it suffices to show when M is injective in $\mathcal{M}A$ that

$$\begin{aligned} H^{s,t}(V(M)) &= 0 \quad \text{for } s > 0, \\ H^{0,t}(V(M)) &\approx \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathscr{M}_A}(\tilde{H}_{\bullet}(S^t), M) \end{aligned}$$

The second isomorphism is evident. For the first, for each $n \ge 0$, let I(n) be the injective unstable A-module on one n-dimensional generator (I(n) is dual to F(n) in [S,E, p. 27]). For $n \ge 1$, $\Omega I(n) = I(n-1)$ and $\Omega^1 I(n) = 0$. Hence 3.5 applies to

show inductively that $H^{s,t}(VI(n)) = 0$ for s > 0, $n \ge 0$. Since any injective $M \in \mathcal{M}A$ is a retract of a direct sum $\bigoplus_{\alpha} I(n_{\alpha})$, it follows that $H^{s,t}(V(M)) = 0$ for s > 0.

4. A generalized *EHP* sequence. Let K be a reduced simplicial set such that the coalgebra H_*K is nice. We shall construct an exact sequence involving E_2K and certain Ext terms. When K is a sphere, this will give a kind of *EHP* sequence on the E_2 level (see 5.3).

Let $\Delta: \tilde{H}_*K \to \Psi(H_*K)$ be as in 2.4 and define

$$\overline{P}(H_*K) = \Omega(\text{Ker }\Delta), \qquad \overline{R}(H_*K) = \Omega(\text{Coker }\Delta)$$

where Ω is as in 3.4. Note that $\overline{P}(H_*K)$ consists of the primitive elements in H_*K with gradations lowered by one; and that $\overline{R}(H_*K)_t = P_{-2,t+1}(H_*K)$ in the notation of [M,S,II].

THEOREM 4.1. If H_*K is nice there is a natural exact sequence

$$\cdots \to \operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{M}_{A}}^{s,t}(Z_{2}, \overline{P}H_{*}K) \to E_{2}^{s,t+1}(K) \to \operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{M}_{A}}^{s-1,t}(Z_{2}, \overline{R}H_{*}K) \to \operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{M}_{A}}^{s+1,t}(Z_{2}, \overline{P}H_{*}K) \to \cdots$$

Proof. Filter the fundamental chain complex $W(H_*K)$ by

$$F_2W(H_*K) \subset F_1W(H_*K) \subset W(H_*K)$$

as follows. Let $F_2W(H_*K)$ be the image of the inclusion $V(\overline{P}H_*K) \to W(H_*K)$ induced by the inclusion $\overline{P}H_*K \to H_*K$. Let $F_1W^s(H_*K)$ be the subspace

$$(\tilde{H}_{*}K \otimes \Lambda^{s}) \oplus (B \otimes \Lambda^{s-1}) \subseteq W^{s}(H_{*}K)$$

where B is the image of $\Delta: \tilde{H}_*K \to \Psi(H_*K)$. It is straightforward to show that

$$\begin{split} H^{s,t}(F_2W(H_*K)) &\approx H^{s,t-1}(V(\bar{P}H_*K)), \\ H^{s,t}(F_1W(H_*K)/F_2W(H_*K)) &= 0, \\ H^{s,t}(W(H_*K)/F_1W(H_*K)) &\approx H^{s-1,t-1}(V(\bar{R}H_*K)) \end{split}$$

and the result now follows from 3.3.

COROLLARY 4.2. If H^*K is a polynomial algebra of finite type, then

$$E_2^{s,t}(K) \approx \operatorname{Ext}_{\mathcal{M}_A}^{s,t-1}(Z_2, \overline{P}H_*K).$$

Proof. This follows from 4.1 since $\overline{R}(H_*K) = 0$.


5. On E_2K in the Massey-Peterson case. Massey and Peterson in [M,P] constructed their unstable Adams spectral sequence for each space K such that H^*K is a free unstable A-algebra [S,E, p. 29]. In particular for such K, H_*K is nice, and we shall show that our E_2K is the same as theirs. Also for such K, 3.3 provides a convenient E_1 -term.

Let $\mathscr{C}A$ be the category of *unstable right A-module homology coalgebras*. That is, each $C \in \mathscr{C}A$ is simultaneously an unstable right A-module and a connected cocommutative coalgebra where the structures are compatible as follows. The comultiplication Δ of C satisfies a Cartan formula; and

$$\sqrt{\cdot} = (\cdot)Sq^n \colon C_{2n} \to C_n$$

where the "square root" map $\sqrt{\cdot}$ is dual to the squaring map for commutative Z_2 -algebras. Of course $H_*K \in \mathscr{C}A$ if K is a reduced simplicial set.

5.1. The functor U_* . For $M \in \mathcal{M}A$ with $M_0 = 0$, define $U_*(M) \in \mathcal{C}A$ together with $j: U_*(M) \to M$ by the universal property:



i.e., for any such $f \in \mathcal{M}A$, there exists a unique $F \in \mathscr{C}A$ such that $j \circ F = f$. If M is of finite type, then $U_*(M)$ is dual to $U(M^*)$ where U is the free unstable A-algebra functor [S,E, p. 29].

THEOREM 5.2. If K is a reduced simplicial set with $H_*K \approx U_*(M)$ in CA, then

$$E_2^{s,t}(K) \approx \operatorname{Ext}_{\mathcal{M}_A}^{s,t}(Z_2, M).$$

Proof. Using the notation of 2.5 and 3.5, let $v: W(H_*K) \to V(H_*K)$ be the chain map

$$v^{s} = f \oplus g \colon (\tilde{H}_{*}K \otimes \Lambda^{s}) \oplus (\Psi(H_{*}K) \otimes \Lambda^{s-1}) \to H_{*}K \otimes \Lambda^{s}$$

where f is the inclusion and

$$g(x \otimes \lambda_l) = \sigma x \otimes \lambda_k \lambda_l \quad \text{if deg } x = 2k+2,$$
$$= 0 \qquad \text{if deg } x = 2k+1.$$

Define a chain map $u: W(H_*K) \to V(M)$ by $u = V(j) \circ v$, $j: H_*K \approx U_*(M) \to M$. Since

$$\overline{P}U_*(M) \approx \Omega M, \quad \overline{R}U_*(M) \approx \Omega^1 M,$$

it is straightforward to show that u induces chain isomorphisms

$$F_2W(H_*K) \approx F_2V(M), \quad W(H_*K)/F_1W(H_*K) \approx V(M)/F_1V(M)$$

using the filtrations of 3.5 and 4.1. Hence

$$u^*$$
: $H^*(W(H_*K)) \approx H^*(V(M))$

and the theorem follows from 2.6 and 3.3.

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REMARK 5.3. When $H_*K \approx U_*(M)$ it follows that the exact sequence of 4.1 for K is equivalent to the sequence of 3.5 for M. If $K = S^n$ this sequence becomes

$$\cdots \to E_2(S^{n-1}) \to E_2(S^n) \to E_2(S^{2n-1}) \to \cdots$$

which is an *EHP* sequence on the E_2 -level (cf. [C3]).

6. A homological interpretation of E_2K . When H_*K is nice E_2K will be described as an Ext using the theory of nonadditive derived functors (see [An] and [B, Appendix]). For any K this Ext also gives the E_2 -term of the unstable Adams spectral sequence constructed in [B,K], and thus our E_2K coincides with theirs when H_*K is nice. More details on the required derived functors may be found in [B] and [B,K].

6.1. Derived functors on $\mathscr{C}A$. Let $\mathscr{C}A$ be the category of unstable A-coalgebras described in §5. An object $I \in \mathscr{C}A$ will be called *cofree* if $I \approx H_*N$ where

$$N=\prod_{n\geq 1}K(\pi_n,n)$$

with each π_n a \mathbb{Z}_2 -module. A cosimplicial resolution of $C \in \mathscr{C}A$ consists of a cosimplicial object X over $\mathscr{C}A$ together with an augmentation $e: C \to X^0$, such that:

- (i) X^n is cofree for $n \ge 0$,
- (ii) the chain complex of graded Z_2 -modules

$$C \xrightarrow{e} X^0 \xrightarrow{\delta} X^1 \xrightarrow{\delta} X^2 \xrightarrow{\delta} \cdots$$

is acyclic, where

 $\delta = \sum (-1)^i d^i \colon X^{n-1} \to X^n$

and the d^i are the coface operators. Such resolutions exist for all $C \in \mathscr{C}A$. If $T: \mathscr{C}A \to \mathscr{B}$ is any functor to an abelian category \mathscr{B} , then T has right derived functors

 $R^sT\colon \mathscr{C}A\to \mathscr{B}, \qquad s\geq 0.$

For $C \in \mathscr{C}A$,

$$R^sT(C) \approx H^s(TX), \quad s \geq 0,$$

where (X, e) is any cosimplicial resolution of C and TX is the cosimplicial object over B with $(TX)^n = T(X^n)$.

For $t \ge 1$ the functor

$$\operatorname{Hom}_{\mathscr{C}_A}(H_*S^t, \cdot): \mathscr{C}_A \to (Z_2\operatorname{-modules})$$

has right derived functors

$$\operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{C}A}^{s,t}(Z_2,\,\cdot) = \operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{C}A}^{s}(H_*S^t,\,\cdot).$$

THEOREM 6.2. If K is a reduced simplicial set with H_*K nice, then there are natural isomorphisms

$$E_2^{s,t}(K) \approx \operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{C}A}^{s,t}(Z_2, H_{\ast}K).$$

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For the proof we need two lemmas concerning the fundamental chain complex $W(H_*K)$.

LEMMA 6.3. If $I \in CA$ is cofree, then

$$H^{s,t}(W(I)) = 0, \qquad s > 0,$$

$$H^{0,t}(W(I)) \approx \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathscr{C}A}(H_*S^t, I).$$

Proof. It is easy to show that $I \approx U_*(M)$ where $M \in \mathcal{M}A$ is injective. Hence for s > 0

$$H^{s,t}(W(I)) \approx \operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{M}_{A}}^{s,t}(Z_{2},M) = 0$$

and the other part is also easy.

For $n \ge 0$ consider the functor (2.5)

 W^n : $CA \rightarrow$ (graded Z_2 -modules).

LEMMA 6.4. If $C \in CA$ is nice as a coalgebra, then

$$R^0W^n(C) \approx W^n(C), \qquad R^sW^n(C) = 0 \quad for \ s > 0.$$

Proof. It suffices to prove the lemma with Ψ in place of W^n . There is an exact sequence of functors on $\mathscr{C}A$

$$0 \longrightarrow \Psi \longrightarrow L_2 \xrightarrow{\delta^{\Delta}} L_3$$

as in 2.4. Since R^0 is left exact and $R^0L_r = L_r$ it follows that $R^0\Psi = \Psi$. There is a natural exact sequence

$$0 \longrightarrow PC \longrightarrow \tilde{C} \xrightarrow{\Delta} \Psi(C)$$

such that Δ is onto when C is cofree. This gives a long exact sequence of derived functors containing isomorphisms

$$R^{s}\Psi(C) \approx R^{s+1}P(C), \qquad s \geq 1.$$

If C is nice as a coalgebra, then [B] implies $R^n P(C) = 0$ for $n \ge 2$, which proves the lemma.

6.5. **Proof of 6.2.** Let (X, e) be a cosimplicial resolution of H_*K . Form a double chain complex DX, where for $m, n \ge 0$

$$(DX)^{m,n} = W^m(X^n)$$

and consider the two spectral sequences converging to the total cohomology $H^*(DX)$. One of them, together with 6.3, shows

$$\operatorname{Ext}_{\mathscr{C}A}^{\mathfrak{s},\ast}(Z_2,H_{\ast}K)\approx H^{\mathfrak{s}}(DX)$$

and the other one, together with 6.4, shows

$$H^{s}(W(H_{*}K)) \approx H^{s}(DX).$$

This completes the proof.

PART II. THE mod 2-LOWER CENTRAL SERIES SPECTRAL SEQUENCE

In this part we prove Theorem 2.6 by making a detailed study of a closely related spectral sequence (§7) constructed by Rector [R].

7. The mod-2 RLCSSS. The filtration of GK by the $\Gamma_s GK$ gives rise to the mod-2 restricted lower central series spectral sequence (abbr. mod-2 RLCSSS), $\{\hat{E}^r K\}$, indexed by

$$\hat{E}^1_{s,q}(K) = \pi_q(\Gamma_s GK/\Gamma_{s+1}GK), \qquad d^r \colon \hat{E}^r_{s,q}(K) \to \hat{E}^r_{s+r,q-1}(K).$$

Note the change of indexing: the filtration s refers to Γ_s , and the q refers to dimension in GK.

It was shown in [R] that for K simply connected and of finite type, $\{\hat{E}^r K\}$ converges to $\pi_* K$ modulo odd torsion. The convergence is much slower than for the $\{E_r K\}$ of §2. Furthermore

$$\pi_q(GK/\Gamma_2GK) \approx \tilde{H}_{q+1}K, \qquad \hat{E}^1_{s,q}(K) \approx \pi_q L_s(GK/\Gamma_2GK)$$

where $L = \bigoplus_{s=1}^{\infty} L_s$ is the free restricted Lie algebra functor (see 7.2.).

It follows that $\hat{E}^{1}(K)$ depends functorally on the graded Z_{2} -module $\tilde{H}_{*}K$, and we shall describe $\hat{E}^{1}(K)$ in 7.3.

DEFINITION 7.1. A graded restricted Lie algebra (over Z_2) consists of a graded Z_2 -module B with $B_m = 0$ for m < 0 together with homomorphisms

$$[\cdot, \cdot]: B_m \otimes B_n \to B_{m+n}, \qquad m, n \geq 0,$$

and functions

$$(\cdot)^{[2]}\colon B_m\to B_{2m},\qquad m\ge 0,$$

such that for w, $x \in B_m$, $y \in B_n$, and $z \in B_q$:

- (i) [x, y] = [y, x],
- (ii) [x, x] = 0,
- (iii) [[x, y], z] + [[y, z], x] + [[z, x], y] = 0,
- (iv) $[x, y^{(2)}] = [[x, y], y],$
- (v) $(w+x)^{[2]} = w^{[2]} + [w, x] + x^{[2]}$.

B is called a restricted Lie algebra if $B_m = 0$ for $m \neq 0$.

EXAMPLE. If A is a graded associative algebra over Z_2 , define for $x \in A_m$ and $y \in A_n$, [x, y] = xy + yx, $x^{(2)} = x^2$. Then A is a graded restricted Lie algebra.

7.2. Free Lie algebra functors. Let M be a graded Z_2 -module with $M_n=0$ for n<0, and let

$$T(M) = \bigoplus_{r=0}^{\infty} T^{r}(M)$$

be the graded tensor algebra generated by M. Then

$$L(M) = \bigoplus_{r=1}^{\infty} L_r(M)$$

is the graded restricted Lie subalgebra of T(M) generated by $M = T^1(M)$. Any homomorphism of $M = L_1(M)$ to a graded restricted Lie algebra B extends uniquely to a map $L(M) \rightarrow B$ of graded Lie algebras.

NOTATION. Let $\overline{H}_{*}K$ denote $\widetilde{H}_{*}K$ with gradation lowered by one.

THEOREM 7.3. If K is a reduced simplicial set, there is a natural isomorphism

$$L(\overline{H}_{*}K) \otimes \Lambda \xrightarrow{\approx} \hat{E}^{1}K$$

under which

$$(L_r(\overline{H}_*K) \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^s)_q \to \widehat{E}_{2^{s_{r,q}}}^1(K).$$

This will follow from 8.5.

8. Simplicial restricted Lie algebras. In order to prove 7.3, we study the natural operations on π_*R where R is any simplicial restricted Lie algebra over Z_2 .

DEFINITION 8.1. For $x \in \pi_m R$ and $y \in \pi_n R$ the Lie product $[x, y] \in \pi_{m+n} R$ is the image of $x \otimes y$ under the composition

$$\pi_m R \otimes \pi_n R \xrightarrow{g} \pi_{m+n} (R \otimes R) \xrightarrow{\mu_*} \pi_{m+n} R$$

where g is the Eilenberg-Zilber map [Mac, p. 239] and μ is the product in R.

DEFINITION 8.2. For $x \in \pi_m R$ and $\alpha \in \pi_n LK(\mathbb{Z}_2, m)$ the composition $x\alpha \in \pi_n R$ is the image of α under the map

$$\bar{f}_*: \pi_n LK(Z_2, m) \to \pi_n R$$

where \overline{f} is the Lie extension of a simplicial homomorphism $f: K(\mathbb{Z}_2, m) \to \mathbb{R}$ with $f_*(i_m) = x$.

For $0 \leq i \leq n$ let $\lambda_i \in \pi_{n+i} L^2 K(\mathbb{Z}_2, n) \approx \mathbb{Z}_2$ denote the nonzero element (see [6A]). If $x \in R_m$ and $0 \leq i \leq m$ then $x\lambda_i \in \pi_{m+i}R$, and we define $x^{[2]} \in \pi_{2m}R$ by $x^{[2]} = x\lambda_m$.

PROPOSITION 8.3. The operations [,] and $(\cdot)^{[2]}$ make π_*R a graded restricted Lie algebra (over Z_2). Furthermore

(i) For $x, y \in \pi_m R$ and i < m

$$(x+y)\lambda_i = x\lambda_i + y\lambda_i.$$

(ii) For $x \in \pi_m R$, $y \in \pi_n R$, and i < n

$$[x, y\lambda_i] = 0.$$

(iii) For $x \in \pi_m R$, $0 \leq i, k$, and $i+k+1 \leq m$

$$(x)\lambda_{i}\lambda_{2i+1+k} = \sum_{j\geq 0} \binom{k-1-j}{j} (x)\lambda_{i+k-j}\lambda_{2i+1+j}.$$

Proof. Part (iii) is a consequence of [6A]. The others are straightforward using simplicial formulas, of [C2, p. 84], or by universal examples; e.g. for (ii), take $R=L(K(Z_2, m) \oplus K(Z_2, n))$. These examples are analyzed by means of 8.4.

8.4. Decomposition of $L(M \oplus N)$. If M and N are (simplicial) Z_2 -modules, there is an isomorphism [Sch]

 $D_1 \oplus D_2: L(M) \oplus L(N \otimes T(M)) \rightarrow L(M \oplus N)$

where D_1 and D_2 are the restricted Lie maps induced respectively by

$$M \xrightarrow{\subset} L(M \oplus N)$$

and by the homomorphisms

$$N \otimes T^{s}(M) \rightarrow L(M \oplus N)$$

sending

$$n \otimes m_1 \otimes \cdots \otimes m_s \rightarrow [\cdots [n, m_1], \ldots, m_s].$$

The isomorphism may be iterated to yield a decomposition

$$L(M \oplus N) \approx L(M) \oplus L(N) \oplus L(N \otimes M) \oplus L(N \otimes M \otimes M)$$
$$\oplus L(N \otimes M \otimes N) \oplus \cdots$$

THEOREM 8.5. If X is a simplicial Z_2 -module there is a natural isomorphism

$$L(\pi_*X) \stackrel{\sim}{\otimes} \Lambda \xrightarrow{\simeq} \pi_*LX.$$

Proof. The inclusion

$$\pi_*X = \pi_*L_1X \subset \pi_*LX$$

extends uniquely to a map $L(\pi_*X) \to \pi_*LX$ of graded restricted Lie algebras. This extends uniquely to a homomorphism

$$L(\pi_*X) \otimes \Lambda \to \pi_*LX$$

by interpreting the elements $\alpha \in \Lambda$ as composition operations. (The relevant operations are additive by 8.3(i).) This homomorphism is an isomorphism in the case $X = K(Z_2, n)$ by [6A], and thus in the general case by 8.4.

REMARK 8.6. The operations [,], ()^[2], and () λ_i on π_*LX are completely determined by 8.3 and 8.5. Clearly 8.5 implies 7.3. It also provides a classification of homotopy operations for simplicial restricted Lie algebras.

9. Samelson products. If G is a simplicial group, the commutator pairing

$$\langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle : G \land G \to G$$

with $\langle g, h \rangle = ghg^{-1}h^{-1}$ induces the Samelson product

$$\langle , \rangle : \pi_m G \wedge \pi_n G \to \pi_{m+n} G$$

for $m, n \ge 0$, which is bilinear for $m, n \ge 1$. See for example [C2, p. 103] for a representative simplicial formula. This product in π_*GK corresponds (with appropriate signs) to the Whitehead product in π_*K .

THEOREM 9.1. If K is a reduced simplicial set, there are natural pairings

$$[,]: \hat{E}^{r}_{s,t}(K) \otimes \hat{E}^{r}_{u,v}(K) \to \hat{E}^{r}_{s+u,t+v}(K)$$

making $\hat{E}^{r}(K)$ a graded Lie algebra for $r \ge 1$ and satisfying:

(i) If r=1 then [,] is the Lie product of §8.

(ii) If $r \ge 1$, and $x, y \in \hat{E}^r(K)$, then

$$d^{r}[x, y] = [d^{r}x, y] + [x, d^{r}y]$$

(iii) The product [,] in $\hat{E}^{r+1}(K)$ is induced by that in $\hat{E}^{r}(K)$.

(iv) If K is simply connected and of finite type, then the product [,] in $\hat{E}^{\infty}(K)$ is induced by the Samelson product in π_*GK .

This theorem is an easy corollary of 9.4 (iii).

REMARK 9.2. It follows by §8 that in $\hat{E}^1 K \approx L(H_*K) \otimes \Lambda$ the only nontrivial Lie products are those involving elements in the summand $L(\overline{H}_*K)$.

9.3. Generalized Samelson products. The commutator map for a simplicial group G gives a pairing

$$\langle , \rangle : (\Gamma_r G / \Gamma_{r+k} G) \land (\Gamma_s G / \Gamma_{s+k} G) \to \Gamma_{r+s} G / \Gamma_{r+s+k} G$$

for r, $s \ge 1$ and $1 \le k \le \infty$ where $\Gamma_{\infty}G = *$. This pairing induces the generalized Samelson product $\langle , \rangle : \pi_m(\Gamma_r G/\Gamma_{r+k}G) \land \pi_n(\Gamma_s G/\Gamma_{s+k}G) \to \pi_{m+n}(\Gamma_{r+s}G/\Gamma_{r+s+k}G)$ for m, $n \ge 0$ which is bilinear for m, $n \ge 1$.

For k fixed,

$$\{\pi_*(\Gamma_r G/\Gamma_{r+k}G)\}_{r\geq 1}$$

has the product \langle , \rangle , and (if $k < \infty$) has differential

 $\partial: \pi_{\ast}(\Gamma_{r}G/\Gamma_{r+k}G) \to \pi_{\ast-1}(\Gamma_{r+k}G/\Gamma_{r+2k}G)$

given by the boundary map for the fibration

$$\Gamma_{r+k}G/\Gamma_{r+2k}G\to \Gamma_rG/\Gamma_{r+2k}G\to \Gamma_rG/\Gamma_{r+k}G.$$

PROPOSITION 9.4. If $1 \leq k \leq \infty$, $x \in \pi_m(\Gamma_r G/\Gamma_{r+k}G)$, $y \in \pi_n(\Gamma_s G/\Gamma_{s+k}G)$, and $z \in \pi_q(\Gamma_t G/\Gamma_{t+k}G)$, then:

(i) For $m, n \ge 1$

$$\langle x, y \rangle + (-1)^{mn} \langle y, x \rangle = 0.$$

(ii) For $m, n, q \ge 1$

$$(-1)^{mq}\langle\langle x, y\rangle, z\rangle + (-1)^{nm}\langle\langle y, z\rangle, x\rangle + (-1)^{qn}\langle\langle z, x\rangle, y\rangle = 0.$$

(iii) For $k < \infty$ and $m + n \ge 1$

$$\partial \langle x, y \rangle = \langle \partial x, y \rangle + (-1)^m \langle x, \partial y \rangle.$$

Proof. Part (i) follows from the usual properties of the smash pairing. For part (ii), use the expression

$$\langle\langle a, b \rangle, c \rangle \langle\langle a, b \rangle, \langle c^{-1}, b \rangle \rangle^c \langle\langle b, c \rangle, a \rangle$$

$$\langle\langle b, c \rangle, \langle a^{-1}, c \rangle\rangle^b \langle\langle c, a \rangle, b \rangle \langle\langle c, a \rangle, \langle b^{-1}, a \rangle\rangle^b$$

which reduces to the identity in any group. For part (iii), consider the pairs

$$(A_i, A'_i) = (\Gamma_i G / \Gamma_{i+2k} G, \Gamma_{i+k} G / \Gamma_{i+2k} G)$$

for i=r, s and r+s. The commutator pairing $A_r \wedge A_s \rightarrow A_{r+s}$ produces a diagram:

in which h is the smash pairing and

$$\partial_* \circ h = h \circ (\partial_* \otimes 1) + (-1)^m h \circ (1 \otimes \partial_*).$$

The result follows easily.

10. The cobar spectral sequence. Let K be a reduced simplicial set. When K is simply connected, the cobar construction of Adams [A2] (or the more recent construction of Eilenberg-Moore [E,M]) provides a spectral sequence converging to H_*GK . We shall construct a version, $\overline{E}(K)$, of this spectral sequence together with a map $\theta: \hat{E}(K) \to \overline{E}(K)$ corresponding to the Hurewicz map $\pi_*GK \to H_*GK$.

For any group G, filter the group ring Z_2G by powers of the augmentation ideal

$$Z_2G = I^0 \supset I^1 \supset \cdots \supset I^n \supset I^{n+1} \supset \cdots$$

Then $\bigoplus_{n \ge 0} (I^n/I^{n+1})$ becomes a Hopf algebra.

LEMMA 10.1. There is a natural homomorphism of Hopf algebras

$$h: T(G/\Gamma_2 G) \to \bigoplus_{n \ge 0} (I^n/I^{n+1})$$

such that h is an isomorphism if G is a free group.

Proof. Let $\theta: G \to I$ be the function $\theta(g) = g - e$. Then θ induces an isomorphism

$$\theta: G/\Gamma_2 G \xrightarrow{\approx} I/I^2$$

and we define h as the unique extension of θ to the tensor algebra. When G is free, h is an isomorphism by the remarks in [Mac, p. 122].

Let $\{\overline{E}^r(K)\}\$ be the spectral sequence arising from the above filtration of Z_2GK .

$$\overline{E}^1_{s,t}(K) = \pi_t(I^s/I^{s+1}), \qquad d^r \colon \overline{E}^r_{s,t}(K) \to \overline{E}^r_{s+r,t-1}(K).$$

1970]

THEOREM 10.2. If K is a reduced simplicial set then:

(i) For $r \ge 1 \overline{E}^r(K)$ is a differential graded Hopf algebra with the structure of $\overline{E}^{r+1}(K)$ induced from that of $\overline{E}^r(K)$.

(ii) $\overline{E}^{1}(K)$ is the tensor algebra generated by

$$\overline{E}_{1,*}^1(K) \approx \overline{H}_*K$$

with differential d^1 on $\overline{E}_{1,*}^1(K)$ given by the comultiplication

$$\Delta \colon \overline{H}_{\ast}K \to \overline{H}_{\ast}K \otimes \overline{H}_{\ast}K.$$

(iii) If K is simply connected then $\{\overline{E}^r(K)\}\$ converges to H_*GK .

Thus $\overline{E}^{\infty}(K)$ is the graded Hopf algebra associated with a decreasing filtration of H_*GK .

Proof. The convergence part follows from [D, §11] when K is a simply connected suspension, and then follows in general by [C, 4.1]. The structure of $\overline{E}^1(K)$ follows from 10.1. Since the components $H_{m+n}K \to H_mK \otimes H_nK$ of d^1 are natural homomorphisms, they must be given by Δ if they are nonzero. Using the examples $K = S^m \times S^n$, one shows they are in fact nonzero. The rest is clear.

REMARK 10.3. It follows immediately from 10.2 (ii) that

$$\overline{E}_{s,t}^{2}(K) \approx \operatorname{Cotor}_{-s,t+s}^{H,K}(Z_{2},Z_{2})$$

(see [M,S, II]).

LEMMA 10.4. For each $n \ge 1$, $\theta(\Gamma_n G) \subset I^n$ and θ gives a homomorphism

$$\theta: \Gamma_n G/\Gamma_{n+1} G \to I^n/I^{n+1}.$$

If G is free then the induced map

$$\theta: L(G/\Gamma_2 G) \to T(G/\Gamma_2 G)$$

is the canonical inclusion.

The proof is straightforward.

PROPOSITION 10.5. The function $\theta: GK \to Z_2GK$ induces a spectral sequence map $\theta: \hat{E}(K) \to \overline{E}(K)$ such that:

(i) For $r \ge 1$, $\theta^r \colon \hat{E}^r(K) \to \overline{E}^r(K)$ is a graded Lie algebra map.

(ii) If K is simply connected of finite type then θ^{∞} : $\hat{E}^{\infty}(K) \to \overline{E}^{\infty}(K)$ is induced by the Hurewicz map $\pi_{*}GK \to H_{*}GK$.

(iii) The map $\theta^1: L(\overline{H}_*K) \otimes \Lambda \to T(\overline{H}_*K)$ restricts to the canonical inclusion on the summand $L(\overline{H}_*K)$ and is zero on the other summands.

The proof is straightforward.

11. The chain complex $L(\overline{H}_*K)$. The image complex of the map (10.5)

$$\theta^1: \hat{E}^1(K) \to \overline{E}^1(K)$$

is the graded restricted Lie algebra $L(\overline{H}_*K)$ with differential

$$\delta^{\Delta}: L_s(\overline{H}_*K) \to L_{s+1}(\overline{H}_*K), \qquad s \ge 1$$

determined by

- (i) $\delta^{\Delta}[x, y] = [\delta^{\Delta}x, y] + [x, \delta^{\Delta}y],$
- (ii) $\delta^{\Delta}(x^{[2]}) = [\delta^{\Delta}x, x],$
- (iii) for s=1

$$\delta^{\Delta} \colon \overline{H}_{*}K \to L_{2}(\overline{H}_{*}K) \subseteq \overline{H}_{*}K \otimes \overline{H}_{*}K$$

is induced by the comultiplication Δ of H_*K .

More generally, let C be any homology coalgebra over Z_2 , and define a differential graded restricted Lie algebra $L(\overline{C})$ as above. For $s \ge 1$ consider

$$B_{s}L(\overline{C}) \subseteq \hat{B}_{s}L(\overline{C}) \subseteq Z_{s}L(\overline{C}) \subseteq L_{s}(\overline{C})$$

where $B_sL(\overline{C})$ (resp. $Z_sL(\overline{C})$) are the boundaries (resp. cycles) in $L_s(\overline{C})$, $\hat{B}_sL(\overline{C})$ is generated by all $b^{[2^j]}$ with $b \in B_rL(\overline{C})$, $2^jr = s$. Define homology groups

$$H_{s}L(\overline{C}) = Z_{s}L(\overline{C})/B_{s}L(\overline{C}), \qquad \hat{H}_{s}L(\overline{C}) = Z_{s}L(\overline{C})/\hat{B}_{s}L(\overline{C}).$$

Note that $\hat{H}_*L(\overline{C})$ is a graded restricted Lie algebra.

The canonical inclusion $L(\overline{C}) \rightarrow T(\overline{C})$ induces a map

$$i: \hat{H}_*L(\overline{C}) \to PH_*T(\overline{C}) \approx P \operatorname{Cotor}^c(Z_2, Z_2)$$

where P denotes the primitive element functor.

THEOREM 11.1. The map i is an isomorphism of graded restricted Lie algebras.

Proof. For $s \ge 2$, we first show that the map

 $\xi \colon \hat{B}_{s}L(\overline{C}) \to \hat{B}_{2s}L(\overline{C})/B_{2s}L(\overline{C})$

defined by $\xi(x) = x^{[2]}$ is an isomorphism. Clearly ξ is a homomorphism since $[x, y] \in B_{2s}L(\overline{C})$ for $x, y \in \hat{B}_sL(\overline{C})$. An inverse to ξ is induced by the natural homomorphism $\eta: L_{2s}(\overline{C}) \to L_s(\overline{C})$ where $\eta[x, y] = 0, \eta(x^{[2]}) = x$.

Choose a set of homogeneous elements $\{z_i\}_{i\in I}$ in $Z_*L(\overline{C})$ corresponding to a basis for $\hat{H}_*L(\overline{C})$; and choose a set of homogeneous elements $\{x_j\}_{j\in J}$ in $L(\overline{C})$ such that $\{\delta^{\Delta}x_j\}_{j\in J}$ is a basis for $B_*L(\overline{C})$. Using the isomorphism ξ it can be seen that

$$\{z_i\}_{i\in I} \cup \{x_j\}_{j\in J} \cup \{(\delta^{\Delta} x_j)^{[2^k]}\}_{j\in J, k \ge 0}$$

is a Z_2 -basis for $L(\overline{C})$. For each $i \in I$ let $K(i) \subset T(\overline{C})$ be the subcomplex with Z_2 basis $\{1, z_i\}$; and for each $j \in J$ let $K(j) \subset T(\overline{C})$ be the subcomplex with Z_2 -basis

$$\{1, x_j\} \cup \{(\delta^{\Delta} x_j)^n\}_{n \ge 1} \cup \{x_j(\delta^{\Delta} x_j)^n\}_{n \ge 1}.$$

Choose a simple ordering of the index sets I and J. Define a chain map

$$h: \left(\bigotimes_{i\in I} K(i)\right) \otimes \left(\bigotimes_{j\in J} K(j)\right) \to T(\overline{C})$$

by $h(u_1 \otimes \cdots \otimes u_r) = u_1 \cdots u_r$.

The Poincaré-Birkhoff-Witt theorem [M,M, §6], shows that h is an isomorphism. Since the complexes K(j) are acyclic, it follows that a Z_2 -basis for $H_*T(\overline{C})$ is given by the elements

$$\{z_{i_1}\cdots z_{i_r}\mid i_1<\cdots< i_r\in I\}.$$

The theorem now follows from [M,M, §6].

REMARK 11.2. The theorem and its proof show how $H_*L(\overline{C})$ may be computed from $P \operatorname{Cotor}^{\mathbb{C}}(\mathbb{Z}_2, \mathbb{Z}_2)$ and $B_*L(\overline{C})$.

12. Differentials in $\hat{E}(K)$. Let K be a reduced simplicial set. Recall from §8 that Λ operates (on the right) on $\hat{E}^{1}(K)$ and that

$$\widehat{E}^{1}(K) \approx L(\overline{H}_{*}K) \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda.$$

THEOREM 12.1. The differentials of $\hat{E}(K)$ satisfy: (i) If $x \otimes \lambda_I \in \overline{H}_*K \otimes \Lambda^s$ with $s \ge 0$ then

$$d^{r}(x \otimes \lambda_{I}) = 0 \quad for \ 1 \leq r < 2^{s},$$

$$d^{2s}(x \otimes \lambda_{I}) = x(\partial \lambda_{I}) + (\delta^{\Delta} x)\lambda_{I} + \sum_{i=1}^{m} (xSq^{i})\lambda_{i-1}\lambda_{I}$$

where $m = [\deg x/2]$.

(ii) If $x \otimes \lambda_I \in L_k(\overline{H}_*K) \otimes \Lambda^s$ with k > 1 and $s \ge 0$, then

$$d^{r}(x \otimes \lambda_{I}) = 0 \quad for \ 1 \leq r < 2^{s},$$
$$d^{2s}(x \otimes \lambda_{I}) = (\delta^{\Delta}x)\lambda_{I}.$$

REMARK 12.2. This theorem reduces the computation of $\hat{E}^2(K)$ to finding $\hat{E}^2_{1,*}(K)$, $\hat{E}^2_{2,*}(K)$, and $H_*L(\overline{H}_*K)$ (see §11).

REMARK 12.3. SUSPENSION. Let SK denote the suspension of K as in [K, p. 311]. The canonical function $K \rightarrow SK$, of degree +1, induces a spectral sequence map

$$\sigma\colon \widehat{E}(K)\to \widehat{E}(SK)$$

sending $\hat{E}_{s,t}^{r}(K)$ to $\hat{E}_{s,t+1}^{r}(SK)$ and commuting with the differentials. It is straightforward to show for r=1 that

$$\sigma: L(\overline{H}_{*}K) \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda \to L(\overline{H}_{*}SK) \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda$$

is given as follows. For j, $m \ge 0$ let e denote the composition

$$(L_{2^{j}}(\overline{H}_{*}K))_{2^{j}m} \xrightarrow{Q} (\overline{H}_{*}K)_{m} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{susp}} (\overline{H}_{*}SK)_{m+1}$$

where Q = ident for j = 0 and $Q = (\eta)^j$ for j > 0 with η as in proof of 11.1. If

$$x \otimes \lambda_I \in (L_k(\overline{H}_*K))_n \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^s$$

then

$$\sigma(x \otimes \lambda_{I}) = (ex) \otimes \lambda_{m} \lambda_{2m} \cdots \lambda_{2^{j-1}m} \lambda_{I} \quad \text{for } k = 2^{j}, \ n = 2^{j} m$$
$$= 0 \qquad \qquad \text{otherwise.}$$

Thus σ maps $L(\overline{H}_*K) \otimes \Lambda$ onto $\overline{H}_*SK \otimes \Lambda$ and maps $H_*K \otimes \Lambda$ injectively.

LEMMA 12.4. The differential d^1 of $\hat{E}^1(K)$ satisfies: (i) For $x \in \overline{H}_*K$

$$d^{1}(x) = \delta^{\Delta}x + \sum_{i=1}^{m} xSq^{i} \otimes \lambda_{i-1}$$

where $m = [(\deg x)/2]$.

(ii) For $x \in L_k(\overline{H}_*K)$ with k > 1

$$d^{1}(x) = \delta^{\Delta} x.$$

Proof. The component $H_*K \to H_*K \otimes \Lambda^1$ of d^1 is determined from [6A] using the iterated suspension map σ .

The components

$$L_k(\overline{H}_*K) \to L_{k+1}(\overline{H}_*K), \qquad k \ge 1,$$

of d^1 are determined using the spectral sequence Hurewicz map of §10. The proof of (ii) is completed using the fact that $\hat{E}^1(K)$ is a differential Lie algebra (9.1), and $\hat{E}^1_{s,*}(K) \approx L_s(\overline{H}_*K)$ for s odd.

12.5. Composition. The composition product

$$\pi_n(\Gamma_r G/\Gamma_{r+1}G) \times \pi_j(\Gamma_s FS^n/\Gamma_{s+1}FS^n) \to \pi_j(\Gamma_{rs}G/\Gamma_{rs+1}G)$$

is defined as usual when G is a simplicial group and F is the free group functor. Let

$$\bar{u} \in \pi_n(\Gamma_r G/\Gamma_{r+1}G), \qquad \bar{v} \in \pi_{i-1}(\Gamma_s FS^{n-1}/\Gamma_{s+1}FS^{n-1})$$

denote the respective images of elements

$$\begin{split} & u \in \pi_n(\Gamma_r G/\Gamma_{r+h} G), \qquad h \ge 1, \\ & v \in \pi_{j-1}(\Gamma_s F S^{n-1}/\Gamma_{s+k} F S^{n-1}), \qquad k \ge 1, \end{split}$$

under the canonical maps. Let

$$\sigma \bar{v} \in \pi_{f}(\Gamma_{s}FS^{n}/\Gamma_{s+1}FS^{n})$$

be the suspension of \bar{v} (see 12.3). Consider the composition

$$\bar{u} \circ (\sigma \bar{v}) \in \pi_{f}(\Gamma_{rs}G/\Gamma_{rs+1}G).$$

The following lemma and its proof are similar to [6A, §3].

LEMMA 12.6. There is an element

$$w \in \pi_{j}(\Gamma_{rs}G/\Gamma_{rs+m}G)$$

where m = Min(sh, rk) such that:

(i) $\bar{u} \circ (\sigma \bar{v})$ is the image of w under the canonical map.

(ii) The element

$$\partial w \in \pi_{j-1}(\Gamma_{rs+m}G/\Gamma_{rs+m+1}G)$$

satisfies

$$\partial w = (\partial u) \circ \bar{v} \qquad \text{if } sh < rk, \\ \partial w = \bar{u} \circ (\sigma \partial v) \qquad \text{if } rk < sh, \\ \partial w = (\partial u) \circ \bar{v} + \bar{u} \circ (\sigma \partial v) \quad \text{if } rk = sh.$$

Proof. Represent u by $\mu \in (\Gamma_r G)_n$ such that $d_n\mu \in (\Gamma_{r+h}G)_{n-1}$ and $d_i\mu = *$ for i < n. Represent v by $v \in (\Gamma_s FS^{n-1})_{j-1}$ such that $d_0v \in (\Gamma_{s+k}FS^{n-1})_{j-2}$ and $d_iv = *$ for i > 0. Write v in the form $B(i^{n-1})$ where B is a formula involving only degeneracy operators and the group operations of product and inverse. Then $B(\mu) \in (\Gamma_{rs}G)_j$ represents $\bar{u} \circ (\sigma \bar{v}) \in \pi_j(\Gamma_{rs}G/\Gamma_{rs+1}G)$ and it is straightforward to show:

$$d_i(B(\mu)) = C(\mu)$$
 for $i = 0$,
= * for $0 < i < j$,
= $B(d_n\mu)$ for $i = j$,

where C is a formula of the same sort as B with $C(i^{n-1}) = d_0 \nu$. Clearly

$$C(\mu) \in (\Gamma_{r(s+k)}G)_{j-1}$$

represents

$$\bar{u} \circ (\sigma \partial v) \in \pi_{j-1}(\Gamma_{rs+rk}G/\Gamma_{rs+rk+1}G)$$

and $B(d_n\mu) \in (\Gamma_{(r+h)s}G)_{j-1}$ represents

$$\partial u \circ \bar{v} \in \pi_{j-1}(\Gamma_{rs+sh}G/\Gamma_{rs+sh+1}G).$$

The result now follows easily.

12.7. Proof of 12.1. Let

$$x \otimes \lambda_I \in (L_k(\overline{H}_*K) \otimes \Lambda^s)_f$$

with deg x = n and s > 0. Then

$$x \in \pi_n(\Gamma_k GK/\Gamma_{k+1}GK),$$

$$\lambda_I \in \pi_{j-1}(\Gamma_{2^s} FS^{n-1}/\Gamma_{2^s+1}FS^{n-1}),$$

$$x \otimes \lambda_I = x \circ (\sigma \lambda_I).$$

(We usually denote $\sigma \lambda_I$ by λ_I .) By [6A] there exists

$$v \in \pi_{j-1}(\Gamma_{2^{s}}FS^{n-1}/\Gamma_{2^{s+1}}FS^{n-1})$$

mapping to λ_I and satisfying

$$\partial v = \partial \lambda_{I} \in \pi_{j-2}(\Gamma_{2^{s+1}}FS^{n-1}/\Gamma_{2^{s+1}+1}FS^{n-1})$$

where $\partial \lambda_I$ is as in 2.3. It follows by 12.6 that $d^r(x \otimes \lambda_I) = 0$ for $r < 2^s$; and $d^{2s}(x \otimes \lambda_I)$ is represented by

$$\begin{aligned} (d^{1}x)\lambda_{I} &\in \pi_{j-1}(\Gamma_{2^{\mathfrak{s}}(k+1)}GK/\Gamma_{2^{\mathfrak{s}}(k+1)+1}GK) & \text{for } k > 1, \\ (d^{1}x)\lambda_{I} + x(\partial\lambda_{I}) &\in \pi_{j-1}(\Gamma_{2^{\mathfrak{s}+1}}GK/\Gamma_{2^{\mathfrak{s}+1}+1}GK) & \text{for } k = 1. \end{aligned}$$

The result now follows from the description of $d^{1}x$ in 12.4.

13. Proof of Theorem 2.6. Let us use temporarily the auxiliary filtration $\{f_s GK\}_{s \ge 0}$, where

$$f_{2j}GK = \Gamma_{2^{j}}GK, \quad f_{2j+1}GK = \Gamma_{2^{j}+1}GK.$$

This gives rise to a spectral sequence $\{e^r(K)\}$, where

$$e_{s,q}^{1}(K) = \pi_{q}(f_{s}GK/f_{s+1}GK), \qquad d^{r}: e_{s,q}^{r}(K) \to e_{s+r,q-1}^{r}(K).$$

Theorem 2.6 follows easily from:

PROPOSITION 13.1. If K is a reduced simplicial set with H_*K nice, then $e_{s,q}^2(K)=0$ for s odd, and the chain complex

$$e_{0,*}^2(K) \xrightarrow{d^2} \cdots \longrightarrow e_{2j,*}^2(K) \xrightarrow{d^2} e_{2j+2,*}^2(K) \longrightarrow \cdots$$

is isomorphic to $W(H_*K)$.

This will be proved in 13.4.

13.2. $L(\overline{H}_*K)$ for H_*K nice. It follows from 11.1 and [B] that when H_*K is nice:

(i) $\hat{H}_s L(\overline{H}^*K) = 0$ unless $s = 2^j, j \ge 0$.

(ii) The Lie products in $\hat{H}_*L(\overline{H}_*K)$ are zero except possibly for those of the form

$$[,]: \hat{H}_1L(\overline{H}_*K) \otimes \hat{H}_1L(\overline{H}_*K) \to \hat{H}_2L(\overline{H}_*K).$$

(iii) For $j \ge 1$

$$()^{[2]}: \hat{H}_{2^{j}}L(\overline{H}_{*}K) \to \hat{H}_{2^{j+1}}L(\overline{H}_{*}K)$$

is an isomorphism.

Define for $j \ge 1$

$$\Psi_{2^{j}}(H_{*}K) = Z_{2^{j}}L(\overline{H}_{*}K)/\widetilde{B}_{2^{j}}L(\overline{H}_{*}K)$$

where $\tilde{B}_{2'}L(\overline{H}_*K) \subset L_{2'}(\overline{H}_*K)$ is generated by all $b^{(2')}$ with $b \in B_{2'}L(\overline{H}_*K)$, k = j-1 > 1.

It follows from the above that when H_*K is nice:

(i) For $j \ge 1$

$$()^{[2]}: \Psi_{2^{j}}(H_{*}K) \to \Psi_{2^{j+1}}(H_{*}K)$$

is an isomorphism.

(ii) The functor Ψ_2 coincides with Ψ in 2.4.

For $j \ge 1$ consider the spectral sequence $\{\mathscr{E}^r(K)\}$ with

$$\mathscr{E}_{s,t}^{1}(K) = \pi_{t}(\Gamma_{s}GK/\Gamma_{s+1}GK) \quad \text{for } 2^{j} \leq s \leq 2^{j+1}$$
$$= 0 \qquad \qquad \text{otherwise}$$

arising from the obvious filtration of $\Gamma_{2'}GK/\Gamma_{2'+1+1}GK$.

LEMMA 13.3. If $H_{*}K$ is nice then $\mathscr{E}_{s,t}^{2^{j}}(K) = 0$ unless $s = 2^{j}, 2^{j+1}$. Furthermore

$$\mathscr{E}_{2^{j},\ast}^{2^{j}}(K) \approx (\overline{H}_{\ast}K \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^{j}) \oplus \left(\bigoplus_{i=1}^{j} Z_{2^{i}}L(\overline{H}_{\ast}K) \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^{j-i} \right),$$
$$\mathscr{E}_{2^{j+1},\ast}^{2^{j}}(K) \approx (\overline{H}_{\ast}K \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^{j+1}) \oplus \left(\bigoplus_{i=1}^{j+1} L_{2^{i}}\overline{H}_{\ast}K/\widetilde{B}_{2^{i}}L(\overline{H}_{\ast}K) \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^{j-i+1} \right).$$

Proof. The spectral sequence $\mathscr{E}(K)$ may be completely computed in the required range using 12.1, 13.2, the proof of 11.1, and one other technique. Namely, there is a map $f: K \to X$ such that X is a product of $K(Z_2, n)$'s and $f_*: H_*K \to H_*X$ is a monomorphism. Since $\hat{H}_s L(\overline{H}_*X) = 0$ for s > 0, it is possible to show certain differentials vanish in $\mathscr{E}(X)$ and consequently in $\mathscr{E}(K)$ by naturality.

13.4. **Proof of 13.1.** The above lemma implies $e_{s,*}^2(K) = 0$ for s odd, $e_{0,*}^2(K) \approx \overline{H}_*K$ and for $j \ge 1$

$$e_{2j,*}^{2}(K) \approx (\overline{H}_{*}K \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^{j}) \oplus \left(\bigoplus_{i=1}^{j} \Psi_{2}(H_{*}K) \widehat{\otimes} \Lambda^{j-i} \right).$$

Thus by 13.2

$$e_{2j,*}^2(K) \approx W^j(H_*K)$$

and it remains only to show that the differential d^2 of $e^2(K)$ corresponds to δ in $W(H_*K)$. For the components 2.5(i) of the differential, this follows easily from 12.1. For the components 2.5(ii), it suffices by naturality (see proof of 13.3) to suppose K is a product of $K(Z_2, n)$'s. Then

$$\Delta: \tilde{H}_*K \to \Psi(H_*K)$$

is onto and the last components may be deduced from the first.

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
